Dear Sheila

Please may we ask your advice on the possibility and pros and cons of re-directing the public right of way on the lower pit path to the upper path? The Westfield Green and Open Spaces Working Group is looking at using s.106 funds to improve accessibility of the upper path of the Pit Path – this being, as you know, the major route between Midsomer Norton and Westfield for pedestrians and cyclists.

One of the cons I expect would be the time and cost in doing so. If you might elaborate on that further it would be helpful. I am preparing a bid for funding to improve accessibility of the upper path particularly in terms of lighting. I attach a map which shows some of the ideas. If it is beneficial for the PROW to be moved to support the fact that the upper path is the one which is used, then perhaps I could include the cost of doing so in the bid.

Alison Sherwin has confirmed that due to budget cuts cycle routes are not being cut back until they are reported individually for emergency work. Every year the upper pit path gets overgrown with nettles and reaches the point of being impassable before it gets cut back. Is the lower pit path, as a PROW on a maintenance schedule? If so, if the PROW were re-routed to the upper path, would the maintenance move with it? In this time of budget constraints it seems like a waste to have the cost of maintaining two parallel paths.

If there are any other issues in this which we ought to be aware from a rights of way perspective we would welcome your views.

3d	Play area at Shakespeare Road	BANES has approved £70k s.106 funding and produced the spec. 13/5/19: There was one response to the consultation of 24 residents at Shakespeare Road, equating to a 4% response rate.
